

The Importance of Preparation and Education In The Making of a Faithful Mason

Anyone who serves in political office should not act politically as a Freemason or in the name of Freemasonry in exercising his rights; such as showing affiliation with any Lodge in his campaign advertising.

We will continue to explore the contents of the Proficiency Manual and gradually delve into the parts of the rituals. Why do we do those rituals? How it was adapted from the Holy Writings and applied to our Craft? Please let us know if you have any inputs or questions concerning our bulletins. As we find this one of the most effective medium to keep the Brethren informed while we are confined in our humble abodes and awaiting that time in patience to meet again, your feedback is important to improve this way of spreading Masonic Education amongst the Brethren.

(The Entered Apprentice Degree)

GENERAL INFORMATION REGARDING FREEMASONRY (PART IV)

(This part should be given before the Entered Apprentice ceremony but could be given along with the Entered Apprentice Education after the ceremony.) *** Note: you will notice that the contents of the general information I copied here are worth remembering due to the fact that these are the answers that you may give to those who are asking about our Craft. Again, the contents herein are copied directly from the manual with a brief narrative comments of the WM.

PREPARATION FOR INITIATION

To get the greatest good from the ceremonies, a Candidate should first prepare his mind for its reception. He should not be apprehensive and should enter the Lodge with the attitude which will enable him to appreciate the serious and solemn ceremonies through which he will pass. The Candidate should pay strict attention to every part of the ceremony in order that he may gain some understanding of the teachings of Freemasonry. The methods we use in teaching will be new and unusual to the Candidate, which is by allegory and symbolism which have been used since ancient times. These methods have been used for over two centuries and have not changed very much since they were originated. Finally, he should learn that every Mason in the Lodge room is his friend and Brother.

NO HORSEPLAY OR HAZING

There is no place for horseplay or hazing during our ceremonies and the Candidate can be assured there will be none. The rituals are serious and solemn; we are trying to teach spiritual lessons with great dignity. Anything which is told the Candidate in a joking manner or to otherwise frighten him, serves only to desecrate the honorable purposes of Freemasonry. The Candidate should have no apprehension about entering a Lodge. He is always entering a society of friends and Brothers where he will be treated with dignity and decorum at all times.

THE HEART OF THE MASONIC FAMILY

Freemasonry is not just another fraternity or association of men banded together for social, political, or economic advantages. Our foundation is built on a philosophy of friendship, Brotherly Love, and a firm belief in a Supreme Being; in other words, the brotherhood of man and the fatherhood of God. Some better known Masons in our history include; George Washington, Patrick Henry, Harry Truman, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, and many others.

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MASONIC EDUCATION FOR PROFICIENCY IN THE E. A. DEGREE

After initiation, the Candidate will receive his "posting lecture" to begin his Masonic education. The assigned coach or member/s of the Education Committee should be present and well prepared to present the portion of the Proficiency Guide Manual titled "The Entered Apprentice Degree".

Make the Candidate feel welcome and at ease. Answer any questions he may have at this point. As the instruction progresses, questions may arise. They should be answered as completely as necessary without giving information which will be covered in the succeeding Degrees. No doubt several questions will begin to form in his mind and should be answered as asked. The Manual will be given to the Candidate to complete the question and answer portion. Ideally, this would be in the presence of his coach or committee member/s. If he is allowed to look up the answers and then write them down, his learning curve will go up immeasurably.

He will also be taught the Due-guard and Sign, the Grip and Word, as well as the E.A. obligation for oral presentation/examination in an open Lodge. The Master or one duly authorized by him will determine the accuracy of the answers to the questions in the manual and report the results to the Lodge. The examination in open Lodge must consist of the demonstration of the modes of recognition and reciting part of the ritual and the obligation. The Master will then declare him proficient in the Degree.

This same process is to be used in all three degrees.

Note: As before, I encourage your inquiries and discussions either by email or our official chat group to benefit the brethren and get their opinions as well. I am sure some of us might not be aware of the contents of the manual that we are sharing here. I hope through this publication, your eager participation to a live LOI is satisfied by its contents.
